<answer: it doesn't have one>

<solicit responses>

To be able to

I will be able to play a few chords

Present Simple I can go	Past Simple I could go	Future WILL I will be able to go	Present Perfect I have been able to go

I go; we finish; they do it; Andy can sort it out; Gordon doesn't attend

INSTRUCTIONS: <Get the students to help you fill in the table with the phrases shown under the table.>
